The Fort Edward Grasslands Important Bird Area

The Fort Edward Grasslands Important Bird Area (IBA) is a 13,000 acre Agricultural grassland complex located in the towns of Ft. Edward, Argyle, and Kingsbury. The IBA contains working farms, grassland areas, cultivated fields, Small woodlots, and wetlands.

The site is the largest intact grassland habitat in eastern New York and is vital for grassland birds, many of whose populations across North America have plummeted in recent years due to habitat loss. High quality grassland acreage in New York State has been rapidly decreasing due to fragmentation and urban sprawl.

- The IBA hosts many summer breeding bird species, including Northern Harrier, Upland Sandpiper, Grasshopper Sparrow, Henslow's Sparrow, Vesper Sparrow, Savannah Sparrow, Bobolink, and Eastern Meadowlark.
- The IBA is also an important raptor wintering area. Species commonly found include Northern Harrier, Short-eared Owl, and Rough-legged Hawk. Non-raptor species that depend on the grasslands include Snow Bunting, Horned Lark, and Lapland Longspur.
- Other interesting sightings in the IBA have included: Merlin, Snowy Owl, Brown Thrasher, Northern Shrike, Blue-winged Warbler, Dickcissel, and Orchard Oriole.


Nearly all acreage in the IBA is privately owned. Pressure from residential development has put this special place at risk for not only the grassland birds, but for residents who value their rural lifestyle.

Bird feeders provide valuable data

Citizen science—the gathering of useful scientific data by regular citizens, rather than by biologists or ornithologists—is an integral part of many research projects sponsored by Cornell Lab of Ornithology.

By collecting information from thousands of backyard bird watchers, a huge database can be amassed more quickly, over a wider area, and at less cost than using field biologists. You can be a part of this by simply watching your feeders and reporting the data.

Project Feederwatch opened for the season on November 14; however, you can still join by signing up at www.birds.cornell.edu/pfw. This five-month effort gathers data which help track winter movements of bird populations and long-term trends in bird distribution and abundance. You choose the days of the week you want to record the birds at your feeders, and you report the highest numbers for each species to Cornell. There is a \$15 fee to participate which helps with the huge cost of recording and processing the data.

If you can't commit to a winter-long project, but do want to contribute, get ready for the Great Backyard Bird Count (GBBC) which will take place on Friday, February 12, through Monday, February 15. Last year's count tallied 93,000 checklists and was the continent's largest instantaneous snapshot of bird populations ever recorded. You can count as little as 15 minutes on one of the count days, or all day all four days! Results are entered online—what could be easier? More information can be found at the GBBC website www.birdsource.org/gbbc.

Participating in these research projects is a great way to pass the winter days and learn more about the birds at your feeder, as well as contributing to important citizen science!

Conservation:

- Attend/speak at town meetings on conservation-related issues; Examples:
 - Fort Edward Grasslands IBA; Re: development; *designated "critical" habitat for endangered Short-eared Owls and other threatened, at-risk and declining grassland bird species - Status: Ongoing
 - Cedar Swamp big box store; Re: development; *protection of watershed, wetlands (*Wal-Mart agreed to reduce impacted wetlands from 7 acres to .2 acres) Status: Monitoring will continue
- Bird Monitoring/Surveys
 - Endangered, threatened, at-risk and declining species of the Fort Edward Grasslands Important Bird Area (Winter Raptors, breeding songbirds, etc.)
 - Peregrine Falcons nesting in SAAS geographic region
 - Bird Atlas 2000 a 5-year monitoring project that resulted in the Second Atlas of Breeding Birds in New York State
 - Kestrel Project, build, place and monitor Kestrel nest boxes
- Bird Counts Christmas Bird Count, Great Backyard Bird Count, Birdathon (it's fun!)
